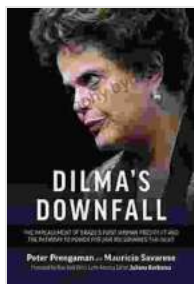

The Impeachment of Dilma Rousseff

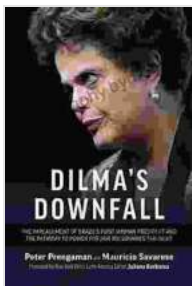

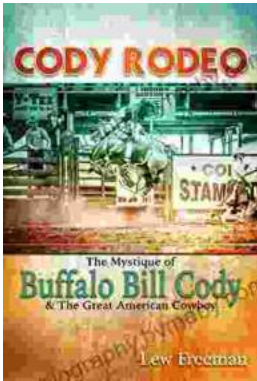
