In 1941, Cunningham was transferred to No. 151 Squadron, which flew Mosquito night fighters. The Mosquito was a revolutionary aircraft that was faster and more heavily armed than any other night fighter in service at the time. 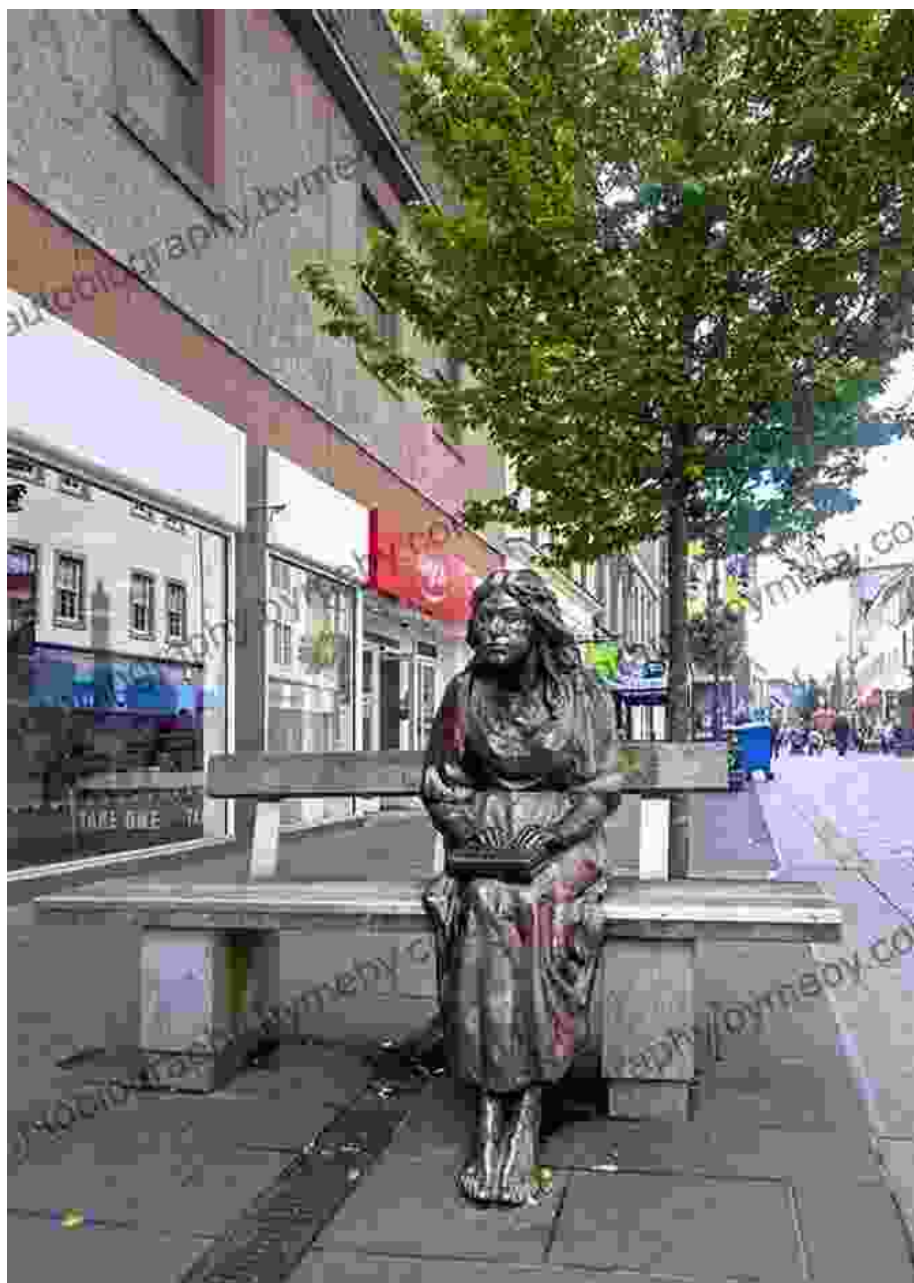

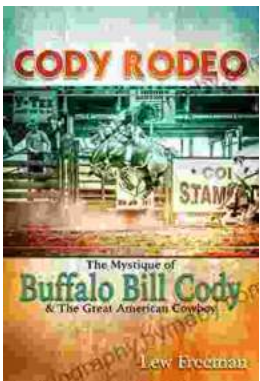
